




The Lahuta is an Albanian instrument made from pumpkin.

That's the opposite of what we do! Isn't that confusing? confusing?


# Did you know?



"What's so special about them?"


"Doesn't your family celebrate Semana Santa, Carlos?" Ruth asked impatiently.


### **LESSONS FROM AN** AFRICAN SAFARI

## **Explore West Africa**


### With Livingstone the Elephant

Another very important aspect of their lives is family. For most people in Africa, family is central to everything they do. So lets learn a little about what family life is like here.



### Families are big

Most families in West Africa are big, really big! In the country of Niger, the average mother has seven children. In the villages and Muslim countries, where a man marries three or four wives, a little boy or girl could have over 25 brothers and sisters! This is one reason that the population of these countries is growing so





#### Families are close

Inside of the house, there usually lives more than just Dad, mom, and the kids. Often times, Grandpa, grandma, aunts, uncles, and cousins all lives together in the same house (which usually isn't very big). It is during weddings that EVERYONE gets together. Almost every member of the family leaves their village to come and celebrate the marriage for several days.

#### Families are strong

Because families are so big and close, they are very strong. This is a great thing but it can also create difficulties. The father usually controls everything in the family, from who you marry to what work you do. This can serve as a major obstacle to a child who wants to accept Christ. If their father is Muslim or Animistic, he can make life very difficult for the child that accepts Christ. On the other hand, when the father accepts Christ, he becomes a powerful testimony for his entire family!



Robert Moffat was born on December 21st, 1795 in Ormiston, Scotland. His parents were devout believers and started teaching Robert at a young age to love and serve his Savior. As he was walking down the road one day, he saw a sign for a missionary prayer meeting and decided to attend. This meeting changed his life. In 1817, he joined the London Missionary Society and went to South Africa.



But problems soon arose for young Robert. He was in love with Mary, the beautiful daughter of his employer. When he asked to marry her, her father refused. He said: "My wife and I have no objection to your marriage, if you will stay in this country; but we will never agree to our only daughter going to some uncivilized land where she would suffer many hardships and, more likely than not, die an early death." Heartbroken, Robert was forced to continue without her. However he was not alone because God was with him. He started out by studying the local language and soon set out for the interior. During their trip, he was invited to set up a church and school in the village of a chief well known for his evil ways and raids on nearby tribes and villages. After attending the services for several months, the chief accepted



Christ. This totally changed the life of the chief and the entire village, which brought a lot of fame to Moffat and the work he was doing. Yet there was also a lot of stress, sickness, and hardship. In spite of all that, Robert kept himself encouraged in the Lord: "In my suffering I am cheered with this one recollection — that it is for Jesus' sake and the salvation of the heathen." When Robert returned to the city, he received great news! Mary's parents had decided to allow her to marry Robert and she was on a trip to join him, These two would go on to accomplish great things for Jesus-Christ!



Amy and David's parents weren't ready to keep going, so Lulu had to say goodbye to her new friends.






